

In 2015, there were **213,736**

Hispanics/Latinx living with HIV in the United States.

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Not all people who have contracted HIV are aware of their infection status. (+) (-) In 2015, it was estimated that

in 6 Hispanics/Latinx living with HIV in the United States **were unaware of their status.**

Hispanics/Latinx are much more likely to have a delayed HIV diagnosis than non-Hispanic whites.

In 2016, **22%** of Hispanics/Latinx were diagnosed with AIDS at the same time as their initial HIV diagnosis.

Viral suppression is when a person has very low levels of HIV in their blood. Achieving viral suppression helps people living with HIV stay healthy and they cannot pass HIV on to sex partners.

HIV Among Hispanics/Latinx in Louisiana

Among all Hispanics/Latinx diagnosed with HIV in 2017 in Louisiana,



4 in 5 were men.

Half of all new HIV diagnoses among Hispanics/Latinx were in the New Orleans Public Health Region. In 2017, 59% of Hispanics/Latinx diagnosed with HIV in Louisiana were gay, bisexual or other men who have sex with men.

16% of Hispanics/Latinx in 2017 in Louisiana were diagnosed with **1/DS** of

their HIV diagnosis.

What YOU can do to prevent the spread of HIV:

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If you are living with HIV, take your medications as prescribed to stay healthy and greatly reduce the risk of passing HIV to a partner.

If you are HIV-negative, ask your doctor about pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), a daily pill to prevent HIV.



Regardless of your status, use a condom every time you have sex. Condoms reduce the risk of getting HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases.
